Several hundred colorful street rods, antiques, customs, classics and sports cars will descend on the Village on the weekend of Aug. 13-15 when members of the Big Bear Lake Antique Car Club display more than \$4 million worth of collector cars in their Fourth Annual Fun Run Car Show.

The three-day event kicks off Friday evening at 6 p.m. when members of the Valley's own F Troop

serve a Western Chuckwagon BBQ dinner to the public at Thundercloud Lodge, the Fun Run's host resort.

The finely-tuned and neatly-polished cars will go on display beginning at 9 a.m. Saturday in the Bartlett Street parking lot and along roped-off streets in the Village.

Entertainment will be provided all day long by deejay Wolfman John, who will spin rhythm & blues, rock 'n roll and ballad hits from his

unique booth in the style of the noted Wolfman Jack.

Refreshments will be available at the Kiwanis Club's snack stand.

An old-fashioned street dance to a live band will be held Saturday evening at the parking lot. Trophies will be awarded to winners of hula hoop, twist and jitterbug contests, and "Best '50s Dress" awards will go to contestants attired in poodle skirts, saddle oxfords, lettermen's sweaters and similar attire.

Sunday's program begins with a Kiwanis pancake breakfast at 6 a.m. at the parking lot. Some 40 trophies will be awarded to the cars judged most outstanding, with one of the presenters being Noel Blanc, the cartoon voice of Bugs Bunny and himself a car buff.

Admission to all events is free. Proceeds from registration fees paid by car owners are donated to the auto shop program at Big Bear High School.
